RingFest is set!

Thirteen Adventist High School and Junior Academy Bell Choirs from all over the Eastern U.S. (more groups than ever before) will be arriving at Toledo First for the Ninth Annual RingFest - Handbell festival and workshop.

Registration will be Wednesday night, October 29; Workshop, October 30 & 31; Concert, Friday October 31 @ 7:30 PM. The Community Outreach this year is the Kidney Foundation of North-West Ohio (KFNWO).

The groups coming this year are: Adelphian Junior Academy (MI), Andrews Academy (MI), Atlanta Adventist Academy (GA), Blue Mountain Academy (PA), C. F. Richards Junior Academy (VA), Greater Lansing Adventist School (MI), Indiana Academy (IN), Mount Pisgah Academy (NC), Mount Vernon Academy (OH), Shenandoah Valley Academy (VA), Spencerville Adventist Academy (MD), Toledo Junior Academy (OH), and Wisconsin Academy (WI).

Housing this year will be at the Quality Inn on Airport Highway. Despite receiving an exceptional deal from the management, this is by far the greatest expense for the festival this year - over \$7000. Any donations from the church family would be greatly appreciated.

Toledo Junior Academy students will be selling candy bars to help offset their costs. (Still getting all the details worked out.)

Our chosen Community Outreach for this year is the Kidney Foundation. There are over 20 million kidney patients in the United States. Of these, over 100,000 need dialysis to survive. The KFNWO helps over 500 kidney patients here in Northwest Ohio each year. Despite government subsidy for kidney patients who have end-stage renal failure, the costs for medications, treatments, and transportation can be overwhelming. Many give up and die. KFNWO provides help to as many patients as they can, but it is never enough. RingFest is partnering with KFNWO this year to help raise money to help those living with renal disease. RingFest participants will be giving out Lollipops in their hometowns in exchange for donations to the KF. RingFest would like to encourage church members who participate in local Trick-or-Treat events to purchase a 100-count box of Lollipops to distribute. The cost per box is \$15. Also, a portion of the freewill offering during the Friday night Concert will be donated to the Kidney Foundation. —Janell Ashley ##

Tent City is all about helping the homeless

"Learn to do good. Work for justice. Help the down(trodden)" Isaiah 1:17

Helping those who are less fortunate is the goal of Tent City—an initiative that raises awareness and services for the homeless. Tent City is the weekend of Oct 31st - Nov 2nd and is being run this year by the group:

1Matters.org, an advocacy group that believes homelessness is an issue that affects us all. 1Matters.org wants to be the "1" that matters to those that matter. This organization gives 100% of the profits to the homeless. It is a solely volunteer group with no salary or overhead.

The homeless & services come together at Tent City

Tent City was started in 1990 to bring the homeless and the services they need together. The homeless are helped to find shelter, medical care, clothing and to get IDs. Meals are served and clothing donated by the community is distributed throughout the three days. People are encouraged to come to the Civic Center Mall in downtown Toledo to volunteer their time, money, and gently used clothing to the homeless. Last year, Tent City delivered over \$50,000 in medical supplies and other services during the weekend. They also want people to stay overnight Friday or Saturday night to get to know and talk to the homeless and enjoy entertainment provided. They feel people will walk away with a better understanding of homelessness.

Churches should be in forefront

1 Matters.org wants church congregations in the area to feel the call to help the homeless. The church should be the leading example to help

others. If churches don't help, then how are we spreading the love that God holds for us and others? It only takes one person to make a difference in the life of someone else—to show that we care.

Tent City is hoping to encourage area churches to have clothing drives and obtain donated backpacks, new socks, shoes, boots, and personal hygiene items. The personal hygiene items include: disposable razors, soap, shaving cream, feminine hygiene products, dental floss, toothbrushes, toothpaste, alcohol-free mouth wash, shampoo, tissues, and combs/brushes.

Bring clothing & toiletries

This year, we are hoping to gather donations from our church. We still need lots of winter clothes for adults and kids and hygiene items. Hopefully, on Sunday, November 2nd, we will have a group of youth, or whoever else feels so called, to go downtown and donate our time to help either feed the homeless or distribute clothing, etc. We, as followers of Jesus are vessels for His love through our donations and time. Life Line Screening comes to Toledo First

If you have not already done so, you can sign up for screenings that will help detect warning signs of stroke. Blood tests will be available too. Depending on the package you choose, the cost runs from \$99 for the complete Lipid Panel, Glucose (blood sugar) and C-Reactive Protein (CRP), to \$219 for three vascular screenings, plus heart rhythm, plus bone density plus the three blood tests.
