Think Outside the Trash This Christmas!

They entered the house and saw the child with his mother, Mary, and they bowed down and worshipped him. Then they opened their treasure chests and gave him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. - Matthew 2:11

What's fire proof, bullet proof, earthquake resistant, well insulated, affordable to build, and helps to save the planet? Give up? It's bottle houses! This December we are choosing an ADRA (Adventist Development and Relief Agency) project to benefit lepers in Mauritania, Africa.

As we know from Bible times, those with leprosy are often cast out and live on the fringes of society. If they can find work at all, it is the lowliest of jobs and doesn't come close to covering the needs of the family. In Mauritania, lepers are often homeless, living out in the blazing sun, monsoon rains, and blowing dust.



Mauritania is a very poor country anyway with the majority of families having to build their own homes from whatever they can find. Since most of the country is desert, homes are not typically built from wood. Bricks are also expensive to make because the bricks need to be heated in a kiln which takes energy in some form (electric, wood, etc.) which people cannot afford.

Our Pantry Helps Feed the Community

Our food pantry has been revitalized and thanks to the generosity of Toledo First members, has been up and running since early September. To date, we have helped to feed 28 people and have been able to encourage and pray with those who come to us for help. The folks that come to us are vulnerable and hurting, and most of them share their plight with us as we gather food for them. Some chatter nervously while others quietly tell us of their circumstances. We certainly have been blessed by their humility and openness as much, if not more than, we have blessed them (hopefully). A couple of our new friends that come to mind are....

George (not his real name), a homeless man came to us for some food because he was walking up Sylvania one Wednesday and saw the sign in front of the church. A gentle and soft spoken man, he apologized for being "choosy," but he was only able to take items that would fit into his backpack.

Susan (not her real name) a middle class woman was embarrassed to have to ask for help, saying that she's never been in such dire straights before. She told us that her husband had recently had a stroke and was now in the rehab center at Kingston, which was taking most of their money every month.

When Covid-19 forced many businesses to shut down, their adult daughter lost her job, and could no longer pay rent, so she moved back to her parents' home with her two children. Susan said she was driving home and praying about how she

was going to feed her family. Then she "happened" to see the sign in front of our church.

Your donations in response to our



specific requests not only help us feed hungry people in our community, but provide an opportunity for Toledo First to minister to and pray with hurting people that need to know Jesus. Thank you for caring!

Enter - the water bottle (or sprite, coke, etc.). Every year, just in the United States, about 60 million plastic bottles end up in landfills. In Mauritania, and other parts of the world, these bottles are being used as 'bricks' to build new cost-effective homes for families.



They are collected from hotels, restaurants, embassies, and, of course, local landfills. They are filled with sand, which is abundant, and packed as tightly as possible. Then they are used in just the same way bricks are, with mortar and string lines to keep everything level. After the walls are built and the roof put on (often a tin roof)

more mortar is put on the outside and inside of the home which completely covers the bottles. The mortar is smoothed out and painted just like a typical stucco wall. Sometimes bottle floors are put inside the house as well.

ADRA's homes are about 228 square feet, which is about a 15' x 15' home. It takes 8,000 bottles to construct them at a cost of about \$35/sq. foot, which, of course, includes the finished interior (kitchen, bathroom, etc.).

What are the benefits of these bottle homes?

First, they are much more resistant to erosion from the constant dust and sand filled wind. Second, they are energy efficient, keeping the inside at a



steady temperature of around 64 degrees F. Next, bottle walls are said to be 20 times stronger than concrete cinder blocks. The job of filling the bottles with sand can be given to people without jobs and even to the handicapped. And finally, non-degradable plastic bottles can be used for something constructive as opposed to filling our landfills and oceans.

So, this December, as we have in year's past, we will be collecting an additional offering each Sabbath after church for ADRA. Any gifts placed in the offering plates held by deacons in the church foyer after worship and any additional monies marked ADRA Water Bottle Houses online or on your tithe / offering envelopes will be given to ADRA. Remember that even Jesus was born with a shelter over His head, crude though it was! ##
