Toledo First's Finances

If you have been to a Toledo First church service and read the bulletin, you will be aware that our church budget is chronically in arrears. Through the end of September, our Combined Budget giving is over a month behind (\$12,375) the budgetary objectives for the first nine months of 2014. Our Tithe income is also down \$7,330 compared to 2013.

By way of review, the Tithe covers expenses of the SDA denomination, with the largest portion going to pay pastors'



salaries, but
also paying a
part of the

Combined
Budget, on
the other
hand, pays

the expenses incurred in operating our local church. These include paying the wages for our hired staff: the church secretary, church janitor and church groundskeeper. Other large expenses include the utilities (electricity, gas and water/sewer) which keep our building comfortable for us. But there are a myriad other expenses also covered, including insurance costs, equipment costs (e.g. copier), trash pickup, snow plowing (a big expense last winter), financial support for our needy students (Worthy Student Fund), support for Mount

Vernon Academy, supplies for our Sabbath School, and support for Local Evangelism and our Pathfinder/Adventurer Clubs.

We have been greatly blessed in recent years by having income for a cell tower lease on our property. From this fund we give a subsidy to our church school (TJA) in the amount of \$36,000 annually. In addition to their classrooms the school is also provided with free utilities. The cell tower lease income also is used for maintaining our facilities, including making repairs to the church parsonage, making improvements in the church grounds, and replacing worn-out air conditioners and furnaces. In the recent past it also paid half the cost of replacing and repainting exterior wood trim on our church (the other half was covered by church members' contributions) and paying a portion of our Youth Pastor's salary (when we had one). A major looming expense which can be funded by the lease income will be the resurfacing of our church parking lot and drive, which in spots has deteriorated beyond the benefits that asphalt resealing can offer.

Toledo First SDA Church's continued success in being a beacon in Toledo depends in part on maintaining a strong financial base. The monetary support of each TF member is needed to continue its mission in our community. Thanks for doing your part to make this possible.

Mark Lowry, who wrote the lyrics to the Christmas song "Mary, Did You Know?" says he's always been amazed by Mary's silence at the cross, as her Son was being crucified. Maybe she was remembering back to that first Christmas, he wonders, when she counted Jesus' fingers and toes.

I wonder if she realized then that those were the same fingers that had scooped out the oceans and formed the seas. I wonder if she realized those were the same feet that had walked on streets of gold and been worshiped by angels. Those little lips were the same lips that had spoken the world into existence. When Mary kissed her little baby, she wasn't just kissing another baby; she was kissing the face of God.

Mary silently watched her Son die 33 years later, Lowry notes—not just for the world but also for His own mother. The baby boy she had delivered on

Here are easy ways to help Toledo Junior Academy

1. **Purchase SCRIP gift cards** for groceries, clothing, restaurants, gas, etc. We have a long list of vendors who are participating retailers. You order the card(s) at face value through the school and the school gets to keep a portion of the cost. Forms are

and the gift cards arrive by Thursday. I could personally give them to you at church if you would like. If the church family really started participating regularly in this program it could amount to thousands of much needed dollars for the school.

2. Collect "box tops for education"

These are located on many products including all General Mills cereals, Kleenex brand tissue,



some Green Giant items, Progresso brand soups, etc. They are each worth 10 Cents. There are also bonus box tops on products occasionally that are worth more than 10 cents. If

everyone collected these and gave to them to the school, the amount we earn could add up fast. You can turn them in either at the school or in the slot on the far right hand side of the magazine rack in the church foyer.

- 3. **Turn in used printer cartridges** to the school. We recycle them and earn cash.
- 4. **Order fresh Florida fruit** through the school. (See separate article on 2nd page.)
- 5. **Donate to the scholarship fund**. It is a line item on the tithe envelope. Many students depend on the generosity of church members in order to attend.
- 6. Pray daily for the teachers, staff, and students.
